

D) The prayer honors God's authority (11:2), our dependence (11:3), our need continual forgiveness on the basis of life change (11:4), and an appeal for a pure life (11:4).

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2) Be Bold In Your Prayers

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- A) In order to further illustrate how we should approach God, Jesus tells a parable about the need to borrow some food from a friend for an unexpected visitor (11:5-8).
- B) In Jewish culture, it was extremely important to provide hospitality to your guests, who often arrived at unexpected times. With no "AM/PM" available, the vivid and humorous situation presented real tension for the listener (11:5-6).
- C) The response of the neighbor is understandable, opening up the house would wake the children and cause too much of a commotion so, no bread for you (11:7).
- D) Jesus however, teaches that it is not because of the relationship (friendship) of neighbors that the request for bread will be fulfilled, but because of "shameless boldness," the willingness to suffer (even) humiliation in asking (11:8).

3) A.S.K. ~ The Three-Fold Reminder To Never Give Up

- A) Jesus explains His parable by telling His disciples they must ask, seek, and knock (A.S.K.) in prayer to God (11:9-11). The point is not three different prayer actions, but an overall attitude of shameless boldness in our everyday prayer lives.
- B) The natural question arises in one's mind (and probably in the disciples minds), "won't that annoy God?" Shouldn't I approach God "only when necessary?"
- C) Rather, Jesus replies that it is the goodness of God and His great desire to love His children, which will provide -- through the Holy Spirit, the needs of those who pray (11:11-13).

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
