BONUS SECTION #6 Old Testament References to God as Father

A few of the following are listed under two headings. This is a new study for me; if you know of any I missed, please let me know.

- 1. Passages which refer to God as father (often small "f") in a simile or metaphor. Psalm 68:5; 103:13; Proverbs 3:12; Isaiah 64:8?; Jeremiah 31:9; Malachi 1:6.
- 2. Passages which talk about how people or the nation of Israel should address God as Father directly, although they do not, or which speak about referring to God as Father in the future, but not at the time of the writing.

 Jeremiah 3:4, 19; Psalm 89:26.
- Passages which refer to God as the Father of an individual, such as Solomon (4x), but not the Father of all believers. 2 Samuel 7:14 (=1 Chronicles 17:13; =22:10, similar to 28:6); Psalm 89:26.
- 4. Passages which refer to God as the Father specifically of Israel, without including all believers. Deuteronomy 32:6; 1 Chronicles 29:10; Isaiah 63:16 (twice); 64:8; Jeremiah 31:9; Malachi 2:10. These include the only four times that God is ever directly addressed as Father in the entire Old Testament: 1 Chronicles 29:10; Isaiah 63:16 (twice); 64:8.

Yet in the Gospels Jesus referred to God as Father over 165 times and directly addressed Him as Father...many boatloads of times!

Note: "Abba" is an Aramaic, not Hebrew, name for Father. It occurs in the New Testament only in Mark 14:36; Romans 8:15; Galatians 4:6. There is no evidence that Jewish people before Jesus ever addressed God as "Abba." Jewish tradition in the time of Jesus dictated that God be addressed in the traditional sacred language of Hebrew, not in the language which the Jewish people in the Holy Land spoke: Aramaic.
