

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Summer of Psalms (S.O.P.'s)

1) Psalm 23 - A Song for the Shepherd

- A. Psalm 23 is the most well-known psalm from the Bible in popular culture, and is used often in popular media, especially movies, television, and song lyrics. A psalm of King David, it is usually grouped with the "Songs of Trust."
- B. Psalm 23 is beloved for both its intimacy and simplicity. Written in a very personal style, it paints a picture of safety and trust experienced in contentment and complete dependency. Written in three memorable parts, the psalmist describes how it feels to follow God through the lens of God's wonderful character.

2) The Promise is in the Name

- A. Whenever you read Psalm 23, remember that "the LORD" is the name which reminds God's people of His great covenant promises to the line of Abraham (land, descendants, blessing) it is God's covenant name (Yahweh). "Yahweh is my Shepherd..."
- B. As well, remember that God fulfilled His promise to Abraham through the life and death of the God-man, Jesus the Christ (Philippians 2:5-11; John 1:1-3, 14, 17-18). Jesus declared, "I am the good shepherd" (John 10:10-15) which means that we are reading about Jesus in Psalm 23!
- C. Psalm 23 is about Jesus, who was the great "I am" revealed to Moses (Exodus 3:13-15), who was before Abraham (John 8:58), who was made manifest in the flesh (1 Timothy 3:16), and is the only name by which you and I can be saved (Acts 4:11-12)!
- D. It is the legacy of God's covenant name, Yahweh, which leads King David to declare, "I shall not want" (Psalm 23:1). This is a declarative statement of contentment; choosing satisfaction in what God provides, how God provides, and when God provides.

3) Shepherding Environments for Flourishing

A. In A Shepherd Looks at Psalm 23, Phillip Keller notes four simultaneously essential environments for sheep to lie down:

- B. These environments give us a more clear idea for why the psalmist emphasizes God's restoration and leading in "paths of righteousness" (Psalm 23:3).

4) The Dark Night(s) of the Soul

A. The intimacy of the language shifts as the psalmist highlights God's most gracious goodness and protective presence in the midst (not the absence) of fear and struggle (Psalm 23:4).

5) Keep Your Eyes on the Prize!

- A. While the darkness seemingly prevails, the promise of salvation is secure in the Good Shepherd who blesses with an abundance of goodness and mercy (Psalm 23:5-6).
- B. In contrast to the temporary nature of a "walk through the valley of the shadow of death," God provides safety and shelter for eternity in the complete provision of His eternal home.
- C. The promise of eternity and God's faithfulness throughout all of history leads God's people to live faithfully, trusting God in every circumstance of tragedy or success (also Psalm 46:1-11).
