## I) UNTIL DEATH DO US PART... SO BRING ON DEATH, AND LET'S PART!

- A. When a man and woman are married to one another, they often declare "vows" to one another to "love and cherish," "in sickness and heath," for "better or worse," which lasts "until death do we part..." Public vows are witnessed by friends and family, and most of all with "God as your witness" are sealed with rings, a public symbol of fidelity to marriage.
- B. Except for some extreme exceptions (e.g. infidelity, abandonment, etc.), marriage binds a man and a woman together until death. Once death occurs, the living partner is no longer considered bound to their marriage vows, and is free to remarry. In this sense, when one spouse dies, the other is automatically "freed" from the "bond of marriage."
- C. Following the same metaphor, each of us were born into an 'arranged marriage' by our ancestral parents, Adam & Eve. In our case, the Law (the rules) 'wed us' to sin, a marriage which brings increased depth of human failure and a spread of the plague of sin to more & more people.
- D. Mankind's marriage to sin which is bound together by Law (Romans 7:1-6) is a reinforcement of the Apostle Paul's previous compare/contrast of slavery & freedom (see Romans 6:20-23). This was an especially hard-to-understand idea for people with a good Jewish background because they felt that following the Law produced righteousness (not true).
- E. Without getting too lost in details, the basic concept Paul is driving at is clear: Our new life is so completely identified with Jesus Christ, that His death is also our death. Since we died, we are free from the Law which binds us to our old (arranged) marriage to sin, and we are now serving/bound to "the new way of the Spirit." Jesus' life is also our life. We are dead to sin, but alive in Christ (Romans 6:2, 11, 7:6). PRAISE GOD!!

## II) I DO NOT WANT WHAT? I DID IT, NO? THERE IS NO TRY. UM, YODA? HUH?

A. There is something unsettling about the Apostle Paul's assertion that the rules and the rulebook (the commandments and the Law) are "holy" and "pure," but still result in bringing out sin, because sin is so evil and



subversive that it can even take what is good, and still finds a way to twist it into something with wicked results (Romans 7:7-12). It's disturbing enough to avoid. Often, we do just that.

- B. But, when we look from a different perspective, it probably makes more sense... Think of anything God created as good and pure. Love, hope, sex, generosity, art, joy, music, beauty, nature, etc. All of these things have been gifted to mankind, and yet, in one way or another, these good things (which we have all experienced), also get twisted and warped, even shattered and broken (and sometimes by the selfish actions of others). All good things get bent by sin. It doesn't make the object bad, but we do find ways to take the good things of God's creation and bend them for ourselves. This is sin, and we all sin (1 John 1:8-10).
- C. To make the point explicit, Paul goes into an extended example (it appears at times from personal experience), of what life is like when you try to achieve righteousness by following rules. Said in a different way, this next section speaks to the schizophrenic fight of living by "codes" & "commands" (Romans 7:6, 12-13) and the futile results these efforts bring, only resulting in captivity to sin & death (Romans 7:13-24).
- D. There are two challenges in Romans 7:15-24. The first is fairly obvious. There are so many "perspective shifts" between Paul's desires and actions, and then there are changing values attached, it's pretty hard to keep track of what is going on... (is he wanting to do what is good, or is he actually wanting what is bad, which can't be good, but why does he call it a desire to do right, right after saying nothing good dwells in him, and how can he say that is bad, or maybe what he means is that if he thinks it's bad, it might actually be good, which makes his original bad stuff kinda good stuff, unless he knows that, which he must because he is writing this whole insane thing, or maybe he doesn't know, or then again, maybe not! Right?! Wait, what are we talking about again?) Exactly. It gets confusing.
- E. But here is the big kicker (#2)... When you read Romans 7:15-24, do you think... "YES! That is my experience?! FINALLY, someone gets me!" Is Paul writing to Christians here? Or, is he writing to Jews who are trying to make a nice "Law-abiding" Jew out of Jesus? Or, is he just making the point that working your way to righteousness by means of the Law is futile? Which one is it? Does Romans 7:25-8:1 help? This is one of the most debated sections of the entire NT! What do you think & why? Is this "normal" for Christ-followers? Or, is this something else? And... if you did feel like this section described your Christian experience, is that the right way to read it? So many questions, so little time...

# 2. Law Reveals Sin A. Read Romans 7:7-9 and Galatians 3:19-22. What is the purpose of the law? Give examples. B. Read Romans 7:9-14. Does law somehow cause sin? What is Paul's point in these verses? 3. Wretched Man That I Am! A. Read Romans 7:15-23. There is much debate on whether Paul writes Romans 7:15-23 from the perspective of one who is a slave to sin (unsaved) or one who has been saved but still struggles with sin. Read these verses. Which statements might lead you to believe he is writing as a slave to sin trying to obey the law? B. Read Romans 7:15-23 again. Which statements might lead you to believe he is writing as a Christian struggling with sin? C. Which perspective do you think is right? Why?

D. Read Romans 7:24-25. What is Paul's conclusion? What is the solution?
