Now it came about at midnight that the LORD struck all the firstborn in the land of Egypt, from the firstborn of Pharaoh who sat on his throne to the firstborn of the captive who was in the dungeon, and all the firstborn of cattle. Pharaoh arose in the night, he and all his servants and all the Egyptians, and there was a great cry in Egypt, for there was no home where there was not someone dead.

~Exodus 12:29-30 (NASB)

1) There Will Be Blood

- A) The first instructions regarding Passover (Exodus 12:3-14) are primarily focused on regulations for Israel's separation from Egypt as God's chosen people.
- B) The next section provides further information regarding Passover for Israel (12:21-28), but is more sharply focused on how Passover protects God's people from destruction.
- C) The acts of Passover, with their violence, blood, smells, tastes, and urgent intensity teach God's people that freedom is not free, but comes at an extraordinary cost!

2) The Final Plague Against Egypt

- A) Finally, the Passover reaches its horrific crescendo with the fulfillment of God's promise to take the life of every firstborn in Egypt, from children to livestock, all of Egypt is caught defenseless against God's wrath (12:29-30).
- B) Pharaoh immediately and emphatically orders Moses and Aaron to get out of Egypt and worship the Lord (12:31-32).
- C) Pharaoh's defeat is so thorough, he asks Moses to pray for him (12:32)! The people of Egypt are terrified of what may happen next at the hands of the Israelites, and plead with them to get out of Egypt quickly (12:33).
- D) God's people don't hesitate in their obedience to God (flee quickly), and in requesting both gold (funds) and clothing (supplies) from their Egyptian captors (12:34-35).

3) Miraculous Protection & Provision

- A) Of course, Israel finds favor with their previous captors, who give them gold and clothing, as we witness God provide Israel with all they need (12:36, 39). God provides for and protects Israel as their mighty LORD and Savior!
- B) Israel has grown from Joseph and his brothers (1:1-7) to over 600,000 "able bodied men," a group numbering somewhere between 2-3 million people (12:37-38).
- C) Israel's captivity lasted exactly 430 years (12:40-41), an extraordinary capstone of God's passionate provision and protection of His people!

For further discussion with your family, spouse, or small group study... Why do you think God required the bloody sacrifice of the unblemished lamb, and the equally bloody ritual of blood on the doorposts of Hebrew homes? Who is the "destroyer" of Exodus 12:23? How can a loving God ("God is love," 1st John 4:8, 16) also be responsible for killing children? Does God still "pass over" His people? How? What is the cost of God "passing over" His people?

Monday ~ Friends Are Everywhere!

A) Arrival in Bethany and Sabbath day. Jesus spends some time with his friends Mary, Martha, and Lazarus. While in Bethany, Mary anoints Christ's feet with costly perfume as an act of humility. This act showed Mary's willingness to give up what she owned (and herself) to serve Jesus (John 12:1-11).

The Triumphal Entry. Jesus rides into Jerusalem on a donkey, fulfilling an ancient prophecy (Zechariah 9:9). The crowds welcomed Christ with "Hosanna's" and the words of Psalm 118:25-26, thus ascribing him a Messianic title as an agent of the

title as an agent of the Lord, the coming King of Israel (Matthew 21:1-11; John 12:12-50).

2) Tuesday ~ Cleaning House!

A) Cleaning out the Temple. Christ comes to the temple area and enters the court of the Gentiles and finds traders and money changers making large profits as they gave out Jewish coins in exchange for pagan money. Jesus drives

them out and overturns their tables (Matthew 21:10-17; Luke 19:45-48).

3) Wednesday ~ Predictions & Parables


A) Christ teaches in parables on the Mount of Olives overlooking Jerusalem. He warns the people about the Pharisees and predicts the destruction of Herod's great temple. He tells of rebuilding the temple in 3 days, and

other future events. Some of Christ's greatest teaching and truth are in these mid-week passages (Matthew 21:18-25:46).

Friday ~ Crucify Him, Crucify Him! Crucifixion of Jesus. The Jewish leaders demand that Pontius Pilate, the Roman authority, crucify Christ. The Beatings & Crucifixion of Jesus Christ

The Last Hours of Jesus		
The Beatings Trials # 1,2	Christ is hit once by the temple guard in Trial #1. In Trial #2, Jesus is blindfolded, and punched by a circle of guards who mock Him.	
The Flogging Pilate's Soldiers Trial #6	Jesus was taken behind Pilate's palace and either tied or pinned to a large wooden post. Using a special whip called a cat of nine tails (9 leather strips with lead weights at the ends, glass and metal embedded in the leather), a Roman soldier beat Christ 39 times across his body. 40 lashes was considered the death penalty. This thrashing of the body oftentimes tore off so much flesh that ribs and vital organs were exposed from the torture.	
The Crucifixion	Christ carried his own cross as far as he could to Golgotha. It was then laid on the ground and Jesus was laid down on it. Christ was stripped naked and then soldiers nailed his wrists to the cross with heavy, wrought-iron nails away from the pulse points. They then bent Christ's legs at the knees and drove a long nail through the top of his feet and through his heel bones. With ropes the cross was hoisted up and wrenchingly dropped into a hole in the ground.
