How to SUPERSIZE Your Prayers and Worship: What Jesus Said about Fasting

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"And when you fast, do not look gloomy like the hypocrites, for they disfigure their faces that their fasting may be seen by others. Truly, I say to you, they have received their reward. But when you fast, anoint your head and wash your face, that your fasting may not be seen by others but by your Father who is in secret. And your Father who sees in secret will reward you." -Matthew 6:16-18

BONUS SECTION #3

Guidelines for Fasting

1. **DON'T** attempt a 40-day fast! It could be physically harmful. Start by fasting one meal. After you have done that a

few times, then try two meals, or fast till sundown. Then fast longer if you wish. But be careful.

2. Another type of fast is a partial fast, like Daniel's in 10:3, where he ate only coarse bread. In this type of fast, you

avoid specific foods for a day or an extended period of time.

- 3. Always drink plenty of water.
- 4. If you are fasting more than a meal or two, watch your health.
- 5. Watch your breath. You will see what I mean. Just sayin'!
- 6. Always keep the purposes of the fast in view, especially humbling yourself and praying.

GROWTH GROUP GUIDE • WEEK 4: MATTHEW 6:16-18

SERMON REFLECTION

What were your thoughts on Sunday's message? Discuss with your group questions you had, things that stood out to you, and impressions you had.

DISCUSSION

- 1. We have been talking recently about hypocrisy in our giving, praying, and fasting. Hypocrisy is basically living in a way that does not conform to your standards or beliefs. What do you think hypocrisy looks like in the context we live in today?
- 2. Romans says love must be without hypocrisy (or positively, love must be genuine). I John says perfect love casts out fear. What do you think love that is imperfect, disingenuous, or hypocritical produces in people?
- 3. It seems that the key to living without hypocrisy is the heart condition of trust. If we trust God, we will believe that He sees what we do in secret and rewards us. If we trust that He is good, we will trust that following His way is His way will really lead to flourishing. If we trust others, we can be open and honest about who we are. How have you seen hypocrisy and distrust relate in your life?

Living like Jesus takes community! Obedience to Christ requires that we do it in the context of relationships. Because of that, we are going to look at various elements of INTENTIONAL GOSPEL RELATIONSHIPS.
