(Psalm 32:1-7) Blessed is the one whose transgression is forgiven, whose sin is covered. Blessed is the man against whom the Lord counts no iniquity, and in whose spirit there is no deceit.

> For when I kept silent, my bones wasted away through my groaning all day long.

For day and night your hand was heavy upon me; my strength was dried up as by the heat of summer. I acknowledged my sin to you, and I did not cover my iniquity; I said,

> "I will confess my transgressions to the Lord," and you forgave the iniquity of my sin.

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Episode Nine: Gospel Lumberjacks

A voice cries: "In the wilderness prepare the way of the Lord; make straight in the desert a highway for our God. Every valley shall be lifted up, and every mountain and hill be made low; the uneven ground shall become level, and the rough places a plain. And the glory of the Lord shall be revealed, and all flesh shall see it together, for the mouth of the Lord has spoken."

Isaiah 40:3-5

1) A New Da

- A) The stories of Jesus Christ and John the Baptist are woven together in Luke's Gospel (Luke 1-2), but now come to the dramatic dawning of their purposes with the introduction of seven different political and religious leaders (Luke 3:1-2)
- B) Roman Emperor Tiberius Caesar came to power in 14 A.D., after his adoptive father (Caesar Augustus) died. The "fifteenth year" of his reign locates the time period near 29 A.D. (Luke 3:1).
- C) Pontius Pilate was a regional prefect (administrator) over the larger area of Judea (modern day Israel) from 26-37 A.D. Historians remember Pilate's rule as "inflexible, a blend of selfwill and relentlessness, whose administration was marked by briberies, insults, robberies, outrages, wanton injuries, frequent executions without trial, and endless savage ferocity."
- D) Herod Antipas and his half-brother Philip both inherited their "tetrarchies" (regional rulership under Rome's leaders) from their father, Herod the Great (cf. 1:5; Matthew 2:16-18). Little is known of Lysanias, whose regional rulership was in Abilene, to the North of Galilee, between Mount Hermon and Damascus.
- E) After these five political rulers (all serving Rome), two Jewish rulers are mentioned. Interestingly, the "high priesthood" is singular, but then "Annas and Caiaphas," are a plurality (3:2). Annas served as High Priest from 6-15 A.D., and was followed by several sons, and eventually his son-in-law, Joseph Caiaphas from 18-37 A.D.; a very powerful religious dynasty (cf. Acts 4:6).

- F) These details provide complex background details for dates, politics, and the religious atmosphere of the day. Further, our re-introduction to John the Baptist identically matches the ancient Jewish prophet introductions (e.g. Isaiah 1:1), pointing toward something monumental emerging on the horizon.
- G) Can you sense the dramatic movement of God? He is bringing salvation from "the wilderness" (cf. Isaiah 40:3, Exodus echo?) through the first prophet in 450+ years (since Malachi)!

2) The Gospel Reveals Jesus

- A) John preaches/proclaims the message placed on him by God (Luke 3:2-3), calling Israelites to be baptized (agreement in a symbolic washing) as a public response affirming an ongoing lifestyle of repentance from sin.
- B) John's message is fueled by a fresh prophetic gift from God (God's truth in modern context) fulfilling ancient prophecies (3:4-6) of a Messianic forerunner (Isaiah 40:3-5, Malachi 3:1) with Elijah-like Spirit-filled preaching and power (cf. 1:17).
- C) It is notable that the "revealed... glory of God" (Isaiah 40:5) is "the salvation of God" (Luke 3:6). The glory of God is revealed for mankind in the "Good News" (Gospel) of Messiah Jesus.
- D) John's baptism is meant as preparation, making a smooth path for the Lord's imminent arrival (3:4-6). As crowds of people came to hear and see John (note Matthew 3:4), it also becomes clear that John's message warns of "wrath to come" (Luke 3:7, also Isaiah 40:6-8), an ominous tone of God's future judgment.

3) Snakes, Stones, and Lumberjacks

- A) John makes sure "the crowds" seeking baptism understand both the gravity and seriousness of repentance, comparing them to poisonous snakes (3:7). The snake was an offensive image of deception and destruction in Israel's history (Genesis 3:1-5), and would have generated immediate objection!
- B) But before the crowds can respond, John proclaims salvation is not an issue of nationality (Abrahamic), but of fruitful living (works of both mind & body) consistent with repentance (responding to God on His terms). Salvation is not inherited (God could make children from rocks if He wants); salvation comes by God's power, through life-altering repentance (3:8).
- C) John's message, like an axe to the root of fruitless trees, warns of judgment for sin leading to destruction (3:9). John's preaching demands response; receive or reject. The way of God is prepared by the call to repent; will you receive or reject?

 - A. The rulers: Tiberius, Pilate, Herod, Philip, Lysanias

3. Verses 7-9: Why were the crowds coming to see John (see also Matthew 3:1-10)? What was his message to them?

B. The priests: Annas and Caiaphas
