But because of his great love for us, God, who is rich in mercy, made us alive with Christ even when we were dead in transgressions — it is by grace you have been saved.

~ Ephesians 2:4-5

1) Filthy Rich

- A) In Israel, very few professions were as despised as tax collecting. The Roman government charged taxes to everyone in their sprawling empire, directly taxing both people and the land. For Israelites, paying taxes to Rome was a painful reminder of Roman occupation and oppression.
- B) In the earliest years of the Roman Empire, the government sent out their own tax collectors to assure they reaped the spoils of their conquering armies. But by the time of Christ, most Roman tax collection officials (known as 'men of the republic' or simply, "publicans") had retired.
- C) Rather than send officials from Rome (costly and unpopular), Rome collected taxes by assessing a local region (for example, Capernaum), and then sold the rights to collect taxes in that area to the highest bidder. The winner/buyer of a local region had to pay the tax to Rome each year, but could keep anything he gathered above and beyond the required tax.
- D) This system of local taxation was a breeding ground for dishonest gain, corruption, and fraud. Taxes were especially heavy for goods being transported from one location to another (grain, vegetables, fish, fruit).
- E) A tax collector could inflate his taxes for any reason, and the fees were often so outrageous (20% 30%), people could not make the required payments. This created a new business for tax collectors, who were also loan sharks, lending out money to the poor to provide payment for their own inflated tolls and then charging ridiculous interest on loaned funds.
- F) People hated tax collectors. They worked for the enemy, they grew fantastically wealthy through their deceitful systems, and they essentially amounted to government sanctioned thieves and robbers. In addition, the Jews especially hated tax collectors because they had extensive contact with Gentiles. In Scripture, tax collectors are almost always associated in groups with sinners, prostitutes, and alcoholics (Luke 5:30, 7:34, 18:11).

2) Jesus Sees & Seeks Rebels

- A) "Matthew Levi, son of Alphaeus" was a tax collector at the tax booth in Capernaum (Matthew 9:9, Mark 2:14, Luke 5:27). His Jewish name, "Levi," means he was the son of a Levite family, the priestly line of Israel. A tax collector from a Levitical family heightens Levi's offensiveness, and reveals a rebellious rejection of God and family in Levi's history. Note also his probable brother, James the son of Alphaeus (6:15).
- B) When Jesus is passing the tax booth of Levi, he stares intently at Levi, seeing more than his offensive decisions and intentional rebellion (5:27). Jesus sees Levi's heart. Jesus does not worry about Levi's past because Jesus is offering him a new future. Levi responds without hesitation (5:28).
- C) Levi decisively breaks away from his old life, recognizing that following Christ can mean leaving relationships, vocations, and lifestyles behind. Is it any wonder that Levi's name is changed to Matthew (like 'Simon' to 'Peter'), meaning "gift of God." The rebel thief becomes God's good gift!

3) Joy Killers & Joy Fillers

- A) In response to Jesus, Levi throws a joyous party and invites his rich tax collecting friends to celebrate (5:29). But there are some people who are bothered Jesus would dare to eat, drink, and have fellowship with sinners.
- B) The Jewish religious elite, leaders among the Pharisees and scribes, accuse Jesus of inappropriate and undignified behavior (5:30). But Jesus will not be swayed by these judgmental joy-killers. Rather, Christ states His purposes clearly, to heal the sick and to save the sinful (5:31-32).
- C) The words of Christ should have convicted the self-righteous Pharisees to consider their hearts. But, as is often true, the religious "in crowd" missed the point. They had become an elite society, a religious country club with clean hands, but lacking in humble hearts of mercy (cf. Hosea 6:6).
- D) Unconvinced by Jesus, the Pharisees continued their attempts to accuse and undermine Jesus and His followers, and even get support from some of John the Baptist's disciples (cf. Matthew 9:14, Mark 2:18).
- E) The Pharisees fasted two days a week (Mondays & Thursdays), and also mourned as part of their fasting. They believed this obvious sacrifice and self-denial pleased God. Religion meant denying what you wanted, and doing things you really didn't want to do. But Jesus completely disagreed!
- F) When Jesus is in our lives, it is a time for celebration, like at a wedding (5:34-35). The old ways (the Law of Moses) had their time, but now new ways (in Christ) had come. They were a new garment and new wine and could not be contained by the old structures (5:36-38).
- G) Jesus warns the religious elite about getting stuck in the "good ol' ways" (5:39). Don't miss life in Christ because of a satisfied life! He is true joy!

2. Verses 33-34: Jesus says that the correct response for His followers in His presence is joy, not mourning. Read John 16:22, Romans 15:13, Philippians 4:4, 1 Peter 1:6-9. Describe the nature of Christian joy (who, what, where/ when, why).

- 3. Verses 36-39: Jesus tells three mini-parables. For each one, what do the elements of the parable represent and what is Jesus' point?
 - A. Patching an old garment with new cloth?
 - B. Putting new wine in old wine skins?
 - C. Drinking old wine or new wine?

- 1. Which is a more likely to be a problem for you: being with friends who are a bad influence or isolating yourself from sinners who need to hear the Gospel?
