Shattered

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He took this from their hand, and fashioned it with a graving tool and made it into a molten calf; and they said, "This is your god, O Israel, who brought you up from the land of Egypt."

Now when Aaron saw this, he built an altar before it; and Aaron made a proclamation and said, "Tomorrow shall be a feast to the LORD."

~Exodus 32:4-5 (NASB)

1) Let's Take Matters Into Our Own Hands

- A) While God has been giving Moses instruction about building the tabernacle and the responsibilities of the priesthood, a great deal of time passes by (Exodus 24:18).
- B) As these "40 days and 40 nights" pass, Moses is physically sustained by God as he fasts from all food and water (Deuteronomy 9:9). But as God & Moses are in the midst of the miraculous, God's chosen people are having an entirely different experience.
- C) There is nothing in the text that indicates Moses had left previously for more than a single day. His long absence is so disturbing to Israel, they decide to take matters of the covenant into their own hands (Exodus 32:1).

- D) It would be easy to take an accusatory tone toward the Israelites, but from their perspective, it seemed that Moses might be gone for good (32:1). They desired to fulfill their end of the covenant relationship, but then made a fatal decision to take matters of worship into their own hands.
- E) Aaron, for his part, seems compelled to participate because of the hostility of the crowd, but is soon a full blown accomplice in fashioning an idol of God which could be worshipped in a more culturally acceptable manner (32:1-4).

2) This Is Your God...

- A) Note that Aaron credits the idol with delivering the people from Egypt (32:4) and even worse, as the LORD (32:5).
- B) The people were not worshipping some sort of pagan god, although that certainly would eventually happen, they were trying to worship God in the way they thought best!
- C) The Israelites were clearly violating the second command (20:4) which God had given them and about which Moses had already told the people (24:3).
- D) The people worship their new idol (32:6) with great satisfaction, choosing the physical idol over God, who insists on being believed, not seen. The Israelites were attracted to this physical idol, more than the One, True God.

3) Moses Uses Visual Aids In Teaching The People

- A) God informs Moses of the people's sin (32:7-8), threatening to wipe out the Israelites and "start over" with His redemptive plan (32:9-10), only relenting from His anger at Moses' passionate appeal (32:11-14).
- B) When Moses returns to camp with Joshua (32:15-17), he hears the partying of the people (32:18) and smashes the tablets of the Ten Commandments (32:19), symbolic of the people breaking covenant with God. Moses grinds the gold calf to dust and adds it to the Israelite water supply (32:20), so that it will become waste, corrupted and defiled.
